## RE: Resolution Condemning the Lafayette Park Peace Vigil Tent Removal

At its regular meeting on Wednesday, September 17, 2025, Advisory Neighborhood Commission 2A ("ANC 2A" or "Commission") considered the above-referenced matter. With four of five commissioners present, a quorum at a duly-noticed public meeting, the Commission, after a motion made by Commissioner Malec and seconded by Commissioner Dicapo, adopted the following resolution by (4-0-0):

WHEREAS, Lafayette Park lies within ANC 2A, in single-member district 2A07<sup>1</sup>;

**WHEREAS**, ANC 2A has a direct and substantial interest in the management of public space and First Amendment activity within its boundaries;

**WHEREAS**, the Lafayette Park Peace Vigil (often referred to as the White House Peace Vigil) began on June 3, 1981<sup>2</sup>, when activist William Thomas initiated a continuous anti-nuclear/anti-war demonstration opposite the White House;

**WHEREAS**, the vigil has since been maintained 24 hours a day by rotating volunteers for more than 44 years, relocating only when logistically required for major events such as the Presidential inauguration, making it widely regarded as the longest-running continuous political protest in U.S. history<sup>3</sup>;

**WHEREAS**, under National Park Service (NPS) regulations for the National Capital Region (36 C.F.R. § 7.96<sup>4</sup>), Lafayette Park is in the "White House area," and demonstrations are permitted there subject to content-neutral time, place, and manner rules;

**WHEREAS**, 36 C.F.R. § 7.96 states that the placement of "structures" is generally prohibited in Lafayette Park and expressly defines "structure" to include tents (§ 7.96(g)(5)(ix)(A) & (A)(4));

WHEREAS, notwithstanding 36 C.F.R. § 7.96's definition of tents as structures, the presidential administrations of Ronald Reagan, George H.W. Bush, Bill Clinton, George W. Bush, Barack Obama and Joseph Biden, as well as the first administration of Donald Trump, have all accommodated the vigil's continuous expressive activity, and refrained from removing tents or other property;

"Serving the Foggy Bottom and West End communities of Washington, D.C."

**WHEREAS**, in August 2025, Rep. Jeff Van Drew (R-NJ) urged the Interior Department to remove the vigil, citing it as a "24/7 eyesore," and D.C. Delegate Eleanor Holmes Norton publicly reaffirmed that the vigil is protected speech and that, had it posed genuine safety or legal problems, it would have been removed long ago<sup>5</sup>;

**WHEREAS**, on September 5, 2025, President Donald Trump publicly stated, in response to a reporter's question about a tent in use by the Vigil: "Take it down, today, right now"<sup>6</sup>;

WHEREAS, on September 7, 2025, the U.S. Park Police removed the aforementioned tent;

WHEREAS, ANC 2A believes that the District should champion lawful, non-violent expression — especially in places of heightened democratic significance, such as Lafayette Park;

**WHEREAS**, Lafayette Park is among the nation's most long-standing and treasured public forums, and suppressing peaceable expressive activity there would chill First Amendment rights, contradict decades of settled practice, and risk inconsistency with 36 C.F.R. § 7.96's neutral permitting framework;

**THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** that ANC 2A strongly condemns the removal of the Lafayette Park Peace Vigil's tent;

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that ANC 2A affirms the vigil's right to continuous, attended, small-group expressive activity in Lafayette Park consistent with 36 C.F.R. § 7.96, and urges the Department of the Interior, NPS, USPP, and the U.S. Secret Service to maintain the long-standing accommodation for this historic protest;

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that ANC 2A opposes any further removal, dismantling, or disturbance of the vigil absent a written, content-neutral determination by NPS/U.S. Park Police (USPP) identifying specific and lawful grounds under 36 C.F.R. § 7.96 (e.g., clear, demonstrable safety or operational concerns), with all attendant due-process safeguards;

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that ANC 2A calls upon Delegate Eleanor Holmes Norton, the Council of the District of Columbia, and Mayor Muriel Bowser to support the vigil's continued operation, publicly oppose any content-based or arbitrary removal, and, where appropriate, to intercede with federal counterparts to ensure continued protection of lawful First Amendment activity at this location.
